

FREQUENTLY ASKED

HOW DO I PURCHASE MESA VERDE NP TOUR TICKETS?

Visit *recreation.gov* to purchase digital park entrance passes and ranger guided tour tickets. Tickets are available 14 days in advance, 8 a.m. MST, on a rolling daily window. For example, tickets for June 16th will be available starting June 2nd. All tour tickets will be sold online or by calling 877.444.6777.

Purchasing tickets in advance is strongly encouraged.

*Note: Once purchased, passes for Mesa Verde National Park must be printed or saved on your mobile device prior to use. Connectivity is limited or non-existent in the park, therefore printing the permit or saving it on your phone (so you can access it even if there is no wi-fi or cell service) is highly recommended.





WILL I SEE WILD ANIMALS?

Yes! Deer, elk, coyote, rabbits and even bear have been spotted. Farm animals such as cows, sheep, horses, chickens and goats are grazing in fields. Lizards are common sights in the desert areas. Less common are snakes, but they do live in the desert, so watch where you step.

ARE PETS ALLOWED?

There is a gated dog park in Cortez that offers lots of room to play and stretch. The dog water fountain is running most months. Pets are not allowed in the cliff dwellings at Mesa Verde National Park, but are allowed on most other area trails.

ARE THERE EV CHARGING STATIONS?

Yes! They are located at: Colorado Welcome Center, Main Street, *Cortez*; Boyle Park, on Grand Avenue, *Mancos*; 420 Central Ave, *Dolores*. There is also a Tesla Charging station in Mesa Verde National Park.

Cell coverage is spotty, but free Wi-Fi is available at most hotels, restaurants and public buildings in Cortez, Dolores and Mancos. Mesa Verde National Park has service at Far View Lodge & Far View Terrace.

WEATHER

Weather in Mesa Verde Country is usually mild, however snowstorms can occur as late as May and as early as October. June through September are warm to hot, with cool evenings.

SPRING

Everything's green! Services are beginning to open Temperatures range from 50-70°F.

SUMMER

Services are fully open and at its busiest. Find quieter areas of the Park by visiting the walking and hiking trails, Wetherill Mesa Loop, and National Monuments such as Hovenweep, Lowry, and Sand Canyon Pueblos. Drink plenty of water in warm months! Heat can be deadly for both pets and humans! Temperatures range from 85-95°F.

AUTUMN

Fall is absolutely magical and the weather is perfect for exploring. Some dwellings and services close in November, but the leaves changing color, warm days and cool nights make it a perfect season for outdoor and cultural exploration. Temperatures range from 40-76°F.

WINTER

A wonderful season for Nordic (cross country) skiing, snowshoeing and walking. Winter trails will be available once there is enough snow. Temperatures range from 28-38°F.

OUTDOOR FUN



TRUST LOOP - (part of Phil's World, Cortez) is a great trail for beginners and those who just want a fun ride. The 3.5 mile singletrack loop offers a fun ride the whole family can enjoy. *mtbproject.com/trail/4536821/trust-loop*

- ADD HIPPY LOOP a nice loop off Trust loop to extend mileage.
- BOGGY DRAW (Dolores) This is a great ride for those hot summer months. The old growth ponderosa forest of the San Juan National Forest keeps the trail mostly shaded and cooler than other local rides. E-bikes not allowed.
 - 8.4 miles, generally smooth, and mostly singletrack, which makes a family friendly day! *mtbproject.com/trail/4352303/boggy-draw-loop*

BLUE / INTERMEDIATE:

- CHICKEN CREEK (Mancos) Chicken Creek Road, #385 is a great beginner route, and you can head off on the "out-and-back" loop from here. It's a nice doubletrack option to extend further up CC as long as time or energy allows.
- > PHIL'S WORLD (Cortez): 26.8 miles of trails, 100% singletrack, e-bikes are not allowed. One of the Bureau of Land Managements "Backyard to Back Country" treasures, "Roller coaster singletrack through the high desert of SW Colorado." – Jeff Fox
- CANYONS OF THE ANCIENTS loop 7.5 mile intermediate-difficult blue trail singletrack
 - This is your trail if you like fun slightly techy singletrack, great scenery, and amazing cliff dwellings. The East Rock Creek Trail section is easy to moderate with a number of short, technical sections. Be on the watch for these sections. They are short and can easily be walked.

ENDURANCE BIKING

Talk about lucky! Road cyclists can enjoy our hundreds of miles of scenic high-altitude drives and byways!

TRAIL BIKING

600 miles of beginner, intermediate and challenging singletrack, climbs, sagebrush, slick rock and old growth forest trails make this the best kept secret in Colorado for biking.

WHAT YOU NEED TO KNOW:

- E-bikes are NOT allowed on many trails; check local regulations before you head out! For the most up-todate regulations, visit *swcocycling.com*
- Bicycle and e-assist rentals, equipment and repair are available.
- Higher elevations of the mesas and mountain trails offer incredible views, and cooler temperatures.
- Spring, summer, and fall are the best times to ride, but winter fat biking makes us a year-round biking adventure!



TRY THESE TRAILS:

- MCPHEE OVERLOOK TRAIL (Trail #155, San Juan National Forest)
- Starting elevation: 6,943 ft.
- Trail length: 8.9 miles one way
 Hiking level: easy to moderate Horses and mountain bikes are allowed on this trail
- WHY IT'S COOL: Trail follows the rim of McPhee Reservoir.
- Can you see the Ghost Town beneath the water?
- GEYSER SPRING TRAIL (#648, San Juan National Forest)
 - Starting Elevation: 8,600 ft.
 - Trail length: 1.3 miles one way
 - · Hiking level: moderate to difficult
 - WHY IT'S COOL: Trail ends at a small pool fed by the only true geyser in the state of Colorado. No swimming allowed.
- > THE BOX CANYON TRAIL (#617, San Juan National Forest)
 - 6.5 miles long. It begins at Forest Road 561 (West Mancos Road) and ends at Forest Trail 621 (West Mancos Trail). The trail is open for the following uses: hiking, horseback riding and motorcycle trail riding.








FISHING & BOATING

WATER, WILDLIFE, WOW!

Rent or bring your boats, kayaks, paddle boards and pontoons and enjoy breathtaking pristine places to add WOW to your stay!

- MCPHEE RESERVOIR The second largest body of water in Colorado, with over 50 miles of shoreline and vermilion cliffs backing up to the San Juan National Forest. A water sportsman paradise, with water skiing, jet skiing, fishing, exploring and feeling the cool lake breeze, McPhee should be a must do on your vacation list. Features a large boat ramp for motorized boating access, and two major entrances into the lake. Doc's Marina is open 7 days a week from May - Oct and offers boat slips and boat rentals, along with jet skis, paddleboards, pontoon boats and more.
- > DOLORES RIVER Major tributaries offer good fishing for rainbow, cutthroat and brown trout. Rafters, kayakers and tubers float down the Upper Dolores during the summer, which empties into the McPhee Reservoir. The Lower Dolores is rafting by permit only during times of large runoffs from McPhee Reservoir. Hop on the River Trail within the Town of Dolores! visitdolores.com
- JACKSON GULCH RESERVOIR Excellent camping, boat ramp. The calm waters of the Jackson Gulch Reservoir provide great family-friendly fishing. Stocked with rainbow trout. Canoes, kayaks and wakeless boating are allowed on this lake. Located in Mancos State Park. 970.533.7065 / cpw.state.co.us

> ALL TERRAIN VEHICLE (OHV/ATV)

There's no end to the experiences you can have! Check out some of the many trails designated for motorized use. Sideby-sides, motorcycles, and OHVs are welcomed on San Juan National Forest designated trails. For detailed maps go to Dolores Ranger District Office, 29211 Hwy 184, Dolores 970.882.7296 *fs.usda.gov/main/sanjuan*. Pick up a Motorized vehicle use map at the Dolores public lands office, or download the Avenza app (*avenzamaps.com*) for more information.

ASPEN LOOP TRAIL - (Trail #631, San Juan National Forest) - A multipurpose trail constructed by the San Juan National Forest and the Four Corners Trail Club. The trail is open to OHV's, motorized trail bikes, horseback riders, hikers, and mountain bikers. This 39-mile loop trail was designated as an OHV trail to accommodate motorized recreation enthusiasts. The parking lot is designed as a turnaround to accommodate trailer parking.

BOGGY DRAW OHV TRAIL -

(#194) - The Boggy Draw OHV trail is 30 miles long. It begins at Forest Road 527 Boggy Draw Rd. and ends at Boggy Draw OHV. The trail is open for the following uses: Off Highway Vehicles (OHV) less than or equal to 50 inches wide. Check with the Dolores Public Lands Office for additional trails and routes. Call 970.882.7296 for more information.



HORSEBACK RIDING

Four Corners Backcountry Horseman's Club educates, encourages and solicits active participation in the wise use of the back country resources. Visit *4cbch.org*

WEST MANCOS TRAIL - (#621, San Juan National Forest) - This trail is ten miles long. The West Mancos Trailhead is located adjacent to the Big Al Trail in the Transfer Recreation Area. Due to the steep nature of the upper portion of this trail, it can be very tricky in wet conditions and, if using this trail in early spring, be especially careful if you are on horseback. The West Mancos Trail continues upstream on the west side of the canyon before dropping to the West Mancos River level, then climbs steeply to Horsefly Flat, an open, grassy area. The trail ends at the Sharkstooth Trailhead, at the base of Hesperus Peak.

WILDLIFE

Mesa Verde Country is a high desert region, so you will see desert animals as well as mountain type animals. Be on the look out for the Collared and sagebrush lizards, Mule Deer, sage grouse, prairie dogs, elk, coyotes, mountain lions, bats, snakes, turkeys and even bear.

CAMPING

FRONT RANGE

FRONT RANGE The Rocky Mountain range most visible from Colorados most populous cities – Denve Colorado Springs, Fort Collins and Boulder – and from much of the Eastern Plains. Much of the urban region near these mountains is known as the Front Range as well.

WESTERN SLOPE

LEARN THE LINGO!

FURTEENER This is what we call those peaks that rise more than 14,000 feet above see level. We've got 58 of them, more than any other state in the continental U.S. Hardy hikers aim to "bag" – or summit – all of them. FOURTFENER

CONTINENTAL DIVIDE CONTINENTAL DIVIDE Also known as "the Divide," this ridge runs along the crests of the Rocky Mountains north to south. Rivers and streams west of the Divide flow to the Pacific Ocean, and east of the Divide to the Gulf of Mexico.

WEDIENTISEOU E This region refers to all of Colorado west of the Continental Divide. It's home to the Grand Mesa, the larges flattop mountain in the world (near Grand Junction). 5280 Derver is the Ville High City because it sits 5,280 feet (or one mile) above seal level. To be precise, the 13th step of the Colorado Stats Ceptol Building or the line of purple seats in Coors Field will put you exactly at 5280. (Pronounced: fifty-two eighty) CENTENNIAL STATE Colorado's official nickname refers to the year it earned statehood. That happened in 1876, the centennial anni-versary of the United States' declaration of independence.

FOUR CORNERS The point where Colorado, New Mexico, Arizona and Utah come together at one point in our extreme southwest corner, 40 miles from the Colorado city of Cortez. HIGH COUNTRY

THE TUNNEL

THE TUNNEL If you are headed to or from the High Country on I-70, you'll likely pass through the .1.7.mile Eisenhower/Johnson Memorial Tunnel. Since 1973, the tunnels have provided easy passage across the Continental Divide.

POWDER DAY

POWDER DAY Powder days follow snowy nights. That fresh snowfall means the conditions are set for sking and boarding that feels like you're floating down the slopes on air. Our deep, dry, fluffy powder is also good for cushioning the occasional fall.

MUD SCASUM This glorious harbinger of spring is typically slotted or the calendar for late April of May. It occurs when winter's snow starts to melt and rive swell, making for amazing fishing, thrilling whitewater rafting and great High Cour lodging deals. A fancy way to say "the mountains," uttered mostly by local weathercasters.

DENVER SHORTHAND

LODO Short for Lower Downtown, Denver's lively, walkable, historic downtown.

LOHI Short for Lower Highlands, a neighborhood full of exceptional food and drink with outstanding views of downtown Denver.

RINO Short for River North, a hip cultural and food scene emerging in Denver's former warehouse district.

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MESA VERDE NATIONAL PARK



Mesa Verde National Park was established in 1906 to preserve and interpret the archaeological heritage of the Ancestral Pueblo people who made it their home. For over 700 years, the Ancestral Pueblo people built thriving communities on the mesas and in the cliffs of Mesa Verde. Today, the park protects the rich cultural heritage of 26 tribes and offers visitors a spectacular window into the past. This World Heritage Site and International Dark Sky Park is home to over a thousand species, including several that live nowhere else on earth.

While still farming the mesa tops, many began living in pueblos they built beneath the overhanging cliffs. The structures ranged in size from one-room storage areas to villages of more than 150 rooms. They continued to reside in the alcoves, repairing, remodeling, and constructing new rooms for nearly a century. By the late 1270s, the population began migrating south into present-day New Mexico and Arizona. Mesa Verde National Park preserves a spectacular reminder of this ancient culture.

The park is open all year long. There is so much to see, even when the ranger assisted tours are closed. Visit by car or on a self guided tour; don't miss the beauty that is a sacred place!

- Get oriented at the Visitor Center at the entrance. Guided tours of some of the dwellings must be purchased in advance. Visit *recreation.gov* to purchase your tickets up to two weeks in advance. Check for current safety conditions and protocols before visiting.
- Interpretive tours can also be purchased at *visitmesaverde.com*
- Pets are allowed inside the Park, but are restricted in many areas. Be sure and check before you enter the Park for rules on bringing Fido. *nps.gov/meve*
- Allow 45-60 minutes to drive to the sites from the Visitor and Research area.
- As you travel into the Park, you will notice a change in elevation. Altitude sickness can occur, take it slow, and drink plenty of water.
- Hiking and climbing ladders in and out is a part of most cliff dwelling tours. Visit the mesa top sites for a less rigorous experience.
- Elevations in the Park range from 6,900 8,572 feet.
- Enjoy hiking, or traveling with your bicycle. Long House Loop is open seasonally, during the day for hiking and bicycle riding.
- Watch for wildlife turkey, deer and bear are very common.
- Wander Prater Ridge Trail, and try to decipher the art on the Petroglyph Trail, or discover the lushness of Spruce Canyon.

EXPLORE THE PARK BY CAR »

MESA TOP LOOP ROAD

A six-mile drive offering amazing canyon views. Learn about the Ancestral Puebloan people's occupation and architecture through time. There are 12 easily-accessible sites, including surface dwellings and cliff dwelling views. Highlights include Square Tower House, Sun Point Overlook, and views of Cliff Palace from Sun Point and Sun Temple

stops. Overlooks also found on the six-mile (10 km) Cliff Palace Loop Road.

CEDAR TREE TOWER

Mesa Top Tower and Kiva and Ancestral Puebloan village can be viewed from the road.

FAR VIEW SITES COMPLEX

FIVE MESA TOP VILLAGES & FAR VIEW RESERVOIR

Hike to see Far View House plus four other villages and a dry reservoir on a level 3/4-mile (1.2 km) unpaved trail.

BADGER HOUSE TRAIL

TRAIL TO FOUR MESA TOP SITES


Journey through 600 years of prehistory. The 2.25 mile (3.6 km) round-trip trail through Badger House Community early mesa-top sites begins at Wetherill Mesa Kiosk.

STEP HOUSE

PITHOUSE, PETROGLYPHS & CLIFF DWELLING

This is one of the only alcove sites that contains evidence of both Basketmaker and Pueblo occupation. Total walking distance is about one mile (1.6 km) round-trip. Trail begins near the Wetherill Mesa Kiosk.







RANGER ASSISTED TOURS »

A ranger-assisted tour is a timed-entry experience that allows visitors to move through a cliff dwelling at their own pace and in a socially distanced way. Rangers stationed along the route will facilitate and provide interpretation. Visit *recreation.gov* to purchase tour tickets, or visit *visitmesaverde.com* for expanded interpretative tours.

The one cliff dwelling that can be visited without a tour is Step House, on Wetherill Mesa. However, there are many self guided villages and dwellings that can be seen year-round.

Cliff Palace, Balcony House, and Long House are all open for the 2022 season. Visit *nps.gov/meve* for current dates and times.

- Tours can be strenuous. Due to high demand during the busy summer season, you may be asked to choose only one tour per day.
- Tour tickets for Cliff Palace and Long House must be purchased in person but can be purchased up to two weeks in advance online.

MESA VERDE'S LARGEST CLIFF DWELLING

Please visit *nps.gov/meve* for current, detailed information on this tour. Please visit *recreation.gov* to purchase tour tickets. This one-hour, Ranger-guided tour involves climbing four 8-10ft. (2.6-3m) ladders on a 100ft (30m) vertical climb. Total walking distance is about 1/4-mile (.4km), round-trip. The tour begins at Cliff Palace Overlook, a 23-mile (37km), one-hour drive from the Visitor and Research Center.

BALCONY HOUSE

The most adventurous tour in the park and not for the faint-ofheart. You will scale the face of a cliff via several tall ladders, squeeze your way through a narrow tunnel on your hands and knees, and explore some of the same passages used over 800 years ago!

For those ready for the challenge, this tour offers you the chance to follow in the footsteps of the Ancestral Pueblo residents who lived there. For a virtual tour, visit *go.nps.gov/BHvideo*

LONG HOUSE

MESA VERDE'S MOST IN-DEPTH TOUR

Please visit *nps.gov/meve* for current, detailed information on this tour for 2022. Please visit *recreation.gov* to purchase tour tickets. Start at Wetherill Mesa information kiosk for a two-hour Ranger-guided tour. This tour involves hiking at least 2.25 miles (3.6km) round-trip, and climbing two 15-foot (4.5m) ladders within the site. The tour ends at the Long House trailhead, giving you a choice of returning to the kiosk or exploring more of Wetherill Mesa on your own. Allow about 2.5 hours (total) for tour and return to the kiosk.

CANYONS OF THE ANCIENTS NATIONAL MONUMENT

At a whopping 176,000 acres, CANM has the highest known density of archaeological sites in the United States. More than 6,000 ancient sites have been identified, including villages, cliff dwellings, underground ceremonial chambers, and rock art. The Monument has been used or inhabited by humans for thousands of years, and continues to be used by humans today. CANM was declared a National Monument in 2000.

- Stop at the CANM Visitor Center and Museum for orientation, maps, and current conditions, visit blm.gov/learn/interpretive-centers/CANM-visitor-center-museum, or call 970.882.5600.
- Did you know? Canyons of the Ancients is part of the Trail of the Ancients National Scenic Byway!

THINGS TO KNOW:

- Dog-friendly with a leash. Please pick up after your pet.
- BRING WATER with you in warm weather.
- Some sites in this "outdoor museum" are not apparent to the untrained eye, and precise locations are not publicized.
- Do not dig in the sites! Do not pick up artifacts! It is illegal to remove artifacts.
- Cell and WIFI service are intermittent.
- Many roads are primitive and unpaved.
- Primitive camping is allowed in most areas.

VISITORS CENTER

This museum is also headquarters for Canyons of the Ancients National Monument, and is considered Southwest Colorado's premier display of the culture and history of the Ancestral Puebloan people, and other Native tribes. The museum also displays methods that modern archaeologists use to reveal the past, and preserves artifacts and records from excavations in the Four Corners area. They also feature special rotating exhibits and events annually.

This museum is family-friendly and wheelchair-accessible. and also offers audio-captioned visuals, public restrooms and bus parking. Golden Pass and/ or America the Beautiful Pass holders get in free. Don't miss the amazing views, picnic areas and two excavated sites on location, which are also wheelchair-accessible.





HOVENWEEP NATIONAL MONUMENT

Hovenweep is the largest site within CANM, and was once home to over 2,500 people. This village was built between A.D. 1200 and 1300, and building similarities in architecture, masonry and pottery styles indicate Hovenweep inhabitants were closely associated with other groups living at Mesa Verde. Explore a variety of structures, including multistory towers, and learn about the people who planted and farmed this area long ago.

THINGS TO KNOW ABOUT HNM:

- Admission is free.
- Do not use GPS to find your way to Hovenweep.
 Follow the directions from their webpage below.
- Hovenweep trails are open year-round, sunrise to sunset, depending on weather conditions.
- 31 tent campsites open year-round. Picnic tables and flush toilets available.
- Square Tower is the most accessible of the five sites within Hovenweep.
- Bring your hiking shoes for some really wonderful trails to hike. Be aware that cell service can be intermittent.
- Pets on a leash are allowed on trails. Please pick up after your pet.
- Summer gets HOT!! Pets can die from heat exhaustion. Do not leave your pets inside of your vehicle in the summer.

DON'T MISS »

LOWRY PUEBLO

The only developed recreation site within the Monument. It has standing walls that have been stabilized, 40 rooms, eight kivas and a Great Kiva - underground ceremonial chamber. The picnic area, restroom, and trail are all wheelchair-accessible. There is no water or phone service.

SAND CANYON TRAIL

This 6.5-mile trail is used for hiking and mountain biking. It is one of the largest prehistoric settlements in this region, and has 420 rooms, 100 kivas, and 14 towers, but no exposed walls. Sand Canyon Pueblo is adjacent to the upper (north) trailhead for Sand Canyon. There is a small parking area, but no water, restroom, phone or wheelchair-access.

UTE MOUNTAIN TRIBAL PARK

The 13 Ute Bands are the oldest residents of Colorado, and historically roamed throughout Colorado, Utah, and New Mexico as hunter-gatherer societies. The separate bands moved with the seasons for the best hunting and harvest. The present-day Weenuche Band live in the communities of Towaoc and White Mesa to the west in Utah. This thriving Band celebrates the Bear Dance and Sun Dance every year, which connect old ways with the new in rich, colorful pageantry of song and dance. The Bear Dance celebration is open to the public. An in-depth experience not to be missed. Knowledgeable Ute Tribal Guides will lead you on an incredible adventure, while they interpret tribal culture, pictographs, cliff dwellings, surface ruins and artifacts. Half-day (easy) tours will visit Ancestral Pueblo petroglyphs, scenic lands, pictographs panels, geological land formations, and surface sites. Fullday (active) tours involve a three-mile walk on unpaved trails and a climb of five ladders to visit four well preserved canyon cliff dwellings in Lion Canyon. A round trip drive on gravel and dirt roads of roughly 80 miles on the full day, and 40 miles for the half-day tours.

Trading posts are a time-honored tradition of working with American Indian artists, and still exist throughout the Southwest. The free museum displays a wonderful collection of antique weavings and other treasures.




THE FOUR CORNERS MONUMENT

This is the only place in the United States where four states meet: Arizona, New Mexico, Utah and Colorado. The nearest town for services and accommodations is Cortez, Colorado roughly 38 miles away.

The original marker erected in 1912 was a simple cement pad, but has since been redone in granite and brass. Navajo vendors sell handmade jewelry, crafts and traditional Navajo foods nearby. Picnic tables and self-contained restrooms are available. This area is very remote, and offers no running water, electricity, or telephones. There is limited cell service.

CORTEZ



Cortez is just eight miles from Mesa Verde National Park, and considered the cultural center of Mesa Verde Country. Strong Agricultural traditions and Native American heritage offer a glimpse into the valley that is shadowed by Mesa Verde. Ancient cliff dwellings, cowboys, and farms mingle with art galleries, shopping and lodging accommodations.

Cortez has long been a trade route for Native and Spanish settlers, and is still considered the trade center for the Four Corners region. Its culture is steeped in the ancient history of the indigenous people who still call this high desert valley home. See intricate artwork, artifacts and customs of the native people at the Cortez Cultural Center. And make Cortez your base camp for the 114-mile Trail of the Ancients Scenic Byway, that tours through natural wonders and archaeological points of interest.

Locally sourced cuisine, Colorado wines, ciders and craft breweries mark the agricultural traditions that date back to the Ancestral Puebloans' cultivation here. Heirloom and heritage corn, beans and squash have been raised in Cortez for centuries. What you see growing in the lush fields translates to the bounty in our local restaurants and weekly farmer's markets.


With more than 600 acres of parks, trails, and open space there's plenty of room to play. To the north, you'll find Carpenter Natural Area with 176 acres and easy access to trails. To the south, visit the 122-acre Hawkins Preserve, where you can hike, bike, rock climb and star-gaze from the slick rock trails to the canyon edge overlooking McElmo Creek. Don't miss the excavated archaeological sites in the preserve. After a day making memories, settle in for the night at a cozy Cortez lodge, so you're well-rested when you begin the next day's adventures. Stop by the Colorado Welcome Center, 928 E. DOLORES



ADVENTURE SEEKERS - look no further. This is your base camp for the whole family! With the Dolores River running south into McPhee Reservoir, and beautiful sandstone cliffs surrounding, this charming town offers the perfect location for your next outdoor experience!

Centered between the San Juan National Forest and the Reservoir, Dolores offers plenty of options for stays at motels, cabins and RV Parks, several right on the river. Canyon of the Ancients Museum features two Native American ruins and lots of cultural heritage to wander through.

Mountain bikers and hikers love the uncrowded trails of Boggy Draw, Sage Hen and the River Trail, and fishermen find some of the best fly fishing waters in Southwest Colorado just below the reservoir! Boaters and paddle boarders love McPhee Reservoir, one of the largest and pristine lakes in Colorado, with 50 miles of shoreline and a marina for all your boating and fishing needs.

Trails for horseback riding, dirt biking, hiking and side-by-sides can be found here. Motorcyclists love Dolores for its smooth roads and gorgeous views as they make their way up Highway 145 along the Dolores River. The friendly town welcomes clubs and groups and hosts many public events throughout the season. Winter blesses Dolores with landscape perfect for snowshoeing, snowmobiling and cross country skiing.

Railroad buffs rejoice! In 1891, Dolores became a major stop on the rail line between Ridgway, Telluride and Durango. Check out the Galloping Goose train at the Railroad Museum in Flanders Park, which seats about 20 passengers and still does limited excursions in Durango CO, Chama NM and Ridgway CO. Back in the day it was used to run mail and passengers around the area.






